

Visit to Sabah

Ten JELCW members visited Sabah in October 2013 to celebrate the 25th anniversary of Sabah Theological Seminary (STS) and attend the Graduation ceremony.

The day after we arrived in Malaysia, we went to Basel Christian Church of Malaysia (BCCM) to meet Bishop Dr. Rev. Thomas Tsen. He told us about the history of the church and the support system for the students

Population Increase in Malaysia

As the economy keeps growing at a rapid rate, more and more workers migrate from near-by Indonesia or the Philippines, causing a surge in Malaysia's population. When it became independent from the UK in 1963, the population was 600,000 but now it has reached 3.5 million. There are many Muslim migrants because the state religion is Islam and welcomes Muslim migration accordingly. When it won independence from the UK, Christians outnumbered Muslims. state of Sabah. Now it is vice-versa. Christian population accounts for about 35% in the state of Sabah.

Ballooning Malay Christians

In spite of the surge of Christian population, there is only a limited number of pastors. Therefore, one pastor ministers to 3 or 4 churches.



Bishop Tsen spoke fervently

“What do the students do after they finish Seminary?”

They engage in ministry either at church, or schools/kindergarten attached to the church. In addition, the Mission Center in Sabah extends its work beyond national borders. It sends missionaries abroad, including to China, Madagascar, France, Indonesia, Kyrgyzstan, and Hong Kong.

About the STS

The seminary has a similar curriculum to Japanese seminaries, but the STS covers the tuition for those who want to study there. In return, the students have to serve as pastors for at least five years after graduation. If they quit in less than five years, they have to repay the full scholarship amount. The STS provides rooms for the students' families if he/she is married, so that the students need not worry about leaving the family behind while studying there.

“This year BCCM sent 10 students to the STS. They calculate the tuition needed for each seminarian and determine the scholarship amount.”

BCCM allows some people who have served as a pastor for certain years, to reenter the STS to get degrees if they want to study theology further.

After the dialogue, we looked back at ourselves as Christians living in the same part of neighboring countries, “Yasukuni issues” for example, we felt the dialogue was God’s blessing for having such a precious partnership for mission established firmly between Japan and Malaysia.
