Thank you for remembering the work of JELCW.

In July, September and November last year, the Board visited the disaster-hit areas. There we met Nagomi-kai, a group at the Oppagawa temporary housing that makes woven sandals. This encounter led us to call for contributions of used T-shirts for material. Now, woven sandals and hanging dolls by Hanano-kai, a different group in Oppagawa, are ready to go. We take orders on their behalf (cf. Communication # 40 *Hibiki*). Used T-shirts for material (size L or larger) are still needed.

Invited by Sabah Seminary, 10 members of JELCW went to Malaysia to attend its 25th anniversary and graduation ceremony. Some members visited Sabah for their first time. They were quite impressed by their Malay friends' strong faith and Christian testimony.

To review the work of JELCW and to move it forward, four subcommittees have been established; Board Election (Tokai), Succession of Faith to the Next Generation (West), Sabah Support (Kyushu), General Meeting and Rally (Hokkaido and East) [Districts in parentheses are the responsible districts.] Discussions are presently advancing at the district level. We ask for more involvement by JELCW members whenever possible. Activities: Hokkaido Special District

In Hokkaido, having seen a few women's groups disband, we were concerned about the very survival of the district churchwomen's league over the past two terms that ended the last fiscal year. Our Activities: East District

We have engaged in various projects remembering the victims and survivors of the East Japan Earthquake and Tsunami. The sale of local products from the disaster-damaged areas is one of them. We scheduled a lecture at one of the District leaders' meetings by Japan Lutheran Emergency Relief Chaplain Katsuhiko Noguchi, and Ms. Yumiko Hatakeyama, the public relations officer from Maehama Community Center.

Rev. Noguchi told us about many different aid programs, using a PowerPoint presentation. We learned that the JLER's work was much appreciated in the disaster-hit areas. Ms. Hatakeyama came over from Kesen'numa to tell us about reconstruction of a community center there; how eager and hardworking the local residents were, how cooperative the financial supporters and material contributors were, and how nice the brand-new building is. Thanks to her PowerPoint photos, we were able to imagine the difficulties the survivors had gone through, as many of us are not web-literate, and have not been to the affected areas.

To close the meeting, Ms. Carol Sack played the harp, which accompanied our prayers for the victims to rest in peace, as well as recovery for survivors who still suffer from mental, economic, or health problems.

We would like to continue to remember them and keep working for them not only individually but also collectively as East District.

One attendee said, "A gender perspective, as a discipline, will help people to challenge their own life, I realized. To reinforce this, the lecturer added that being a feminist in society could be compatible with being inclusive: people are able to live as they are even if they are in a weak position. I will remember these words."

The reporter understands that to learn gender issues and to have a gender perspective will ensure that each churchwoman or man will remain as she/he is, which in turn helps the church become more inclusive and reach out with new good news.
