Those of you in Hokkaido and Tohoku must be longing for spring to come.

I have planted violet and pansy seeds which I harvested in the beginning of September. For a long time, only the leaves occupied my flower garden, but finally the flowers started to bloom. Every time I see the small seeds germinate, the leaves grow from two to three and bear beautiful flowers, I think of the wonders of life and God's work. From seeding to blooming, I enjoy watering and weeding while waiting for my flowers.

In May I sow the seeds of aikibas and small hibiscus (about 15 cm high). Trenia seeds are very small, so I wait for them to germinate from where they spilled on the ground, and then transplant the seedlings. In summer the flowers like the ones in the pictures bloom. Ever since I moved to this house 20 years ago, I have been collecting and sowing seeds. In November I sowed King Tut's peas. By mid-April, beautiful wine colored flowers will be seen and peas in purple peapods will be harvested. I relish the feeling of being part of nature.
